PAUL HOECKE Notes from the road What's In A Name

According to my Webster's, a name is "a word or phrase that constitutes the distinctive designation of a person or thing." Which is quite a mouthful, considering how utterly commonplace it is these days to give a name to someone, or something. Heck, humans have been doing it since Year One, seeing as how it made communicating a whole lot easier. Way back then, our cavedwelling ancestors started out having to point and grunt 'her', or 'him', or 'that'. Which you gotta admit was kinda limiting, especially if whoever or whatever was being referred to wasn't, you know, Physically Present. Making up labels for fellow humans, stone tools and other stuff must have been a very early part of what passed for language. And I suspect it could be a daunting task as well.

So, where am I going with this? Well, let's fast forward to the present, and whaddaya know? It turns out that, untold millennia later, the seemingly straightforward process of coming up with an appropriate label still isn't necessarily any easier.

Consider the arguments and agonies some new parents go through, trying to come up with a name for their newborn. Should the baby's name reflect family tradition? Will the grandparents, or in-laws on either side, find it acceptable? Or should the parents ignore all that and pick a name they (hopefully) both agree on? And that's assuming the kid will like it when she or he grows up. Sheesh!

That said, let me propose that it's no different when it comes to naming your favorite ride. (You knew I was getting to that, didn't you?) Ob-

viously, I'm not talking about people who never get past generic labels – like 'the car' or maybe 'the Camry'. No, I'm talking about people like you and me – long-time BMW owners who regard their charges as more than mere appliances. We view them as faithful companions – companion animals, if you will – and treat them accordingly. We house them, feed them all the right fluids, fix their ailments and generally accept them as members of the family. Which of course includes giving them names. And experience tells me this isn't necessarily a piece of cake.

Now, I don't pretend to know how you go about it. Just as I'm in the dark about how Rob Siegel came up with 'Kugel' for his '72 2002tii, or why the Satch Man chose to call his roadster 'Nancy Drew'. But I can regale you with a couple of my car naming episodes. If nothing else, you may find them entertaining.

Actually, coming up with 'Blue Max' for my first BMW, the '72 Bavaria, happened relatively easily. I credit Paul Jr. with the germ of the idea. A four-year-old at the time, he was gaga about planes and thought his first ride in the car was like being in a jet. Okay, that drive, with him in the front passenger seat, may have been kinda fast. Well, Barbara, his mom, was not amused when she got wind of it. Confronting me after the drive, she remarked rather pointedly if I thought I was some sort of Red Baron! That was my Aha! Moment.

You see, I knew that WWI air ace's history, including the decoration, Pour le Merite, he was awarded and its nickname, Blue Max. Coupled

with the Bavaria's color, Atlantik Blau, calling it Blue Max made perfect sense. I even had the name engraved on a dash plaque which the car still bears today. However, naming the six other BMWs I've owned since (including the three I still have) hasn't been easy. In fact, the whole process has, at times, resembled the above-mentioned baby naming conundrum.

One reason I've struggled is a personal quirk: I don't like to pick names I might want to change later. For one thing, people don't change names unless they absolutely must (like if they're going into witness protection). What's more, any ancient mariner will tell you it's bad luck to change a ship's name. And as I see it, Bimmers aren't all that different, seeing as how they also carry us to faraway places. (Mind you, I'm not superstitious. but I sure wouldn't want the merest hint of misfortune to be associated with any members of my stable.) In short, it's taken me a while to choose just the right monikers for my current rides. Which brings me to my most recent BMW acquisition, the Z3 roadster.

I've had the car for three years, but so far, finding a proper name for it has escaped me. Oh, I've heard plenty of suggestions. An old friend who considers himself a wit thought 'Bubba' would make a great name because the car came from the 'Bubba Motor Works' plant in South Carolina! Granted, it was funny, but I nixed that idea; the label evoked images which just didn't suit the Z3. I've also flirted with 'Matilda' because I like the song 'Waltzing Matilda'. But I quickly scrapped it when I recalled that it was the name a college buddy had bestowed on his Jaguar XK-120. I just couldn't see the roadster in the same category; that Jag epitomized everything that's been said about Lucas, the Prince of Darkness! Oh. well.

As you read this, the roadster still lacks a name. But I'm hopeful; one of these days, inspiration will strike me like a bolt out of the blue. Meanwhile, the Z doesn't seem to mind being nameless; it keeps on doing what it's supposed to - deliver gobs of driving fun. And come to think of it. that's what BMWs are all about.

CLUB RACING REPORT.

Locals Win At VIR, NJMP, Road Atlanta; BWR Podium At VIR

Hello again, fellow club racing aficionados. With just ten weeks left until the BMW CCA Club Racing (CR) finale at Roebling Road, it's fair to say that the 2019 season will indeed be one of the most active ever, and a successful one at that, for our homegrown racing crowd. Not only did local hot shoes put pedal to the metal all summer, including three races in August, but some are gearing up for two more this month. And it sure looks like there's more action in the offing before the season is over.

For starters, a 24-hour ChumpCar race, a non-CR event on the VIR's full course in early August, saw a local team, Pinkies Out, win the race overall and in class in their No.246 1988 E30 325. The team members, car owner/builder Chris Huggins and his dad Robert, plus Chip Schenk, Rodger Coan, John Hurley and 'Iron Mike' Hinkley, owed their success to great driving and a car that just wouldn't quit.

As Iron Mike tells us, "each driver ran a 2-hour stint" throughout the race, and the car "ran flawlessly, never needing brakes or tires replaced," with only fuel added during each 5-minute pit stop for driver changes. Having started 32nd in a 78-car field, Pinkies Out forged ahead into the Top Five by the end of the second stint and was leading the field after the third driver change. Thereafter, with Schenk setting the team's fastest time in Lap 489, No.246 stayed at or near the front, and eventually took the checker with 535 laps and almost 1750 miles under its belt! Mike says that, generally, the race ran clean, with only relatively few car-to-car contacts. Although, he adds, there was a slight tap between No.246 and a Prelude

during one of the night stints. The resulting loss of a headlight meant "Turn 3 entry was blind" and made Turn 10 "a little hairy." Clearly, this didn't slow them down any!

Six other BMW teams in the race included Tarheel members. One of the teams, Damson, made up of Jason Crist, Jesse Clark, J.B. Knopp, Jon Adams, Charlie Postin and Cam Evans, finished a very close third overall in their 1999 E46 325. Mike says the only thing that kept them from finishing second was a broken shift linkage rod which took them twelve minutes to fix. And one of Sri Racing's three entries, the No.69 '87 E30 325is piloted by Charles Harding, Jeff Blum and Mike Stoltzfus, finished fifth. All in all, our guys did great and evidently had a good time too.

A week later, three of our perennial Spec E36 contenders, Phil Antoine, Bert Howerton and Jack Wilkins, made their mark in a four-sprint CR event on NJMP's Lightning course. Antoine beat Wilkins to the checker to win the first race Saturday after a bobble in Lap 4 put Wilkins in a hole. But Wilkins recovered on Sunday, posting class victories in all three of the day's races, with Howerton finishing second

Next came the Labor Day weekend race at Road Atlanta. A National event consisting of an enduro and three sprints, it had fifteen local track warriors battle class rivals in a 40-plus-car field and rack up thirteen class wins in the process. Krista Williams shone in C-Mod, posting overall victories in the long race Friday and the two Sunday sprints, while Harding took the overall win in Saturday's feature sprint. Sri Haputantri chalked up D-Mod victories in all four races; in Spec E36,

Tom Tice won the enduro and one of the sprints Sunday, but Howerton beat him to the checker in the other two sprints; and KP racer Rob Chrystler easily beat two class rivals to win the class trophy in the endurance race. Well done, guys!

With all the CR action out West, the rest of September saw no races in our neck of the woods. But as you read this, local hot shoes are already lining up for two CR events this month. By press time, Amy Oldenburg and fellow Spec E46 racer Tony Cottrell had signed up for the race at Watkins Glen two weeks from now; and the roster for CMP, two weeks later, listed at least three of our guys, Todd Newcomer (DM), plus Mark Fishero and Howerton in Spec E36 among the entrants. And that's not the last of it by a long shot.

Of course, the Roebling Road race in mid-December is bound to attract a host of local racers. But on top of that, we see that there's also a ChumpCar 'Double 8' event on VIR's North Course a couple of weeks before that. We think it's an easy bet that several local teams will race in that event as well. So, stay tuned.

Turning to the pro front: In late August, the BimmerWorld Racing (BWR) duo of James Clay and Devin Jones in the No.82 BMW M4 GT4 re-

sumed their quest to regain the lead in the IMSA Michelin Pilot Challenge standings in Round Eight at VIR. But it's an uphill battle. For the benefit of those of you who weren't there, BWR's results were a mixed blessing. In a race marked by varying weather conditions and a flurry of full course yellows during the final 30 minutes, BWR's second entry, the No.80 BMW M4 GT4 of Ari Balogh and Mike Skeen (replacing Seth Thomas) surprised some observers by making it to the GS podium with a well-deserved third-place finish. However, the No.82 team wasn't nearly as fortunate, as contact late in the race took Jones out of the running. They were classified as having finished 19th, which dropped them farther back to third place in the standings, a whole 29 points behind the leaders.

The next race, Round Nine at Laguna Seca on the second weekend last month, ran well after our deadline for this report. Consequently, our coverage of this race as well as the upcoming series finale at Road Atlanta two weeks from now, will appear in next month's report. Meanwhile, let's all keep it between the ditches with the shiny side up.

We Dunn It!

We originally feared that August 24th would be a hot and steamy day, so we switched from a trip to the NC Zoo to allow for a visit to the bucolic small town of Dunn. The air conditioning of an indoor event seemed an ideal counter to the normal summer fun in NC. Ironically, a large line of rainstorms hit the Old North State on this date, bring both a bit of rain and diving temperates. So, it turned out to be a great idea that we planned an indoor event ... for all the "wrong" reasons. The zoo adventure will, no doubt, be great in October.

Despite the cool temps and the high probability for "significant dampness", we still had nine cars ... and 16 of the BMW faithful ... join us for the days adventure. This turned out to be our last event to start at the Grounds Café in Wendell since they are closing to make room for a new restaurant. We were nevertheless able to grab one last cup of coffee before striking out for the target of our quest, Dunn.

Oddly, the weather was completely dry when we rolled out, giving us a chance to have a rollicking romp across Wake, Johnston and Harnett Counties as we motored south. We stuck to the wonderful byways in this part of the world, giving us a chance to charge through rolling farmland

(All Americans) and 101st (Screaming Eagles) Divisions were directly under General Lee's careful tutelage at Fort Bragg (NC) and Fort Benning (GA). Lee and his wife, Dava, both grew up in the area and came home to Dunn when his war



service ended. Their home is now a wonderous collection of materials and information that highlighted their amazing lives and his contributions to America's collective history.

General Lee's early career included studying at NC State, heading to France in WWI to be part of the American Expeditionary Forces, learning French while he was there allowing him to become a liaison officer between the American and French military leaders ... then going to French "tank driving" school to learn how to use this emerging technology. The young man who left Raleigh on horseback came come a completely different person, who was well prepared to make

an outsized impact based on his wide-ranging experiences.

All of this was shared with us by Gloria, the docent at the museum ... and herself a retired high school teacher. She was thrilled to have such a large group of highly motivated students and we enjoyed a tour of the entire former residence of The General, including the third floor that is clearly reserved for "special occasions".

After our tour, we headed over to The Broad Street Deli, a remarkable eatery in downtown Dunn. The owner, Jamie, had made special arrangements to ensure that our large party would have great service when we descended around 1pm. We weren't disappointed ... the service, the food, the ambiance were all excellent. Lively discussions ensued as we swapped stores and enjoyed every aspect of the menu, including an amazing blueberry cake that was the perfect dessert to punctuate the whole event.

After lunch, some went shopping in local stores, others went off to the Town of Dunn museum, and others headed for home. A terrific jaunt back on some fantastic country roads was made a little more exciting when monsoon-like rains finally arrived. No matter ... it was a pleasant end to a fantastic day behind the wheel of the Bimmers. Simply a brilliant way to enjoy a Saturday: great friends, terrific food, awesome roads and fine dining. 
