PAUL HOECKE Notes from the road Little Things Mean A Lot

If you happened to be a fly on my home office wall right now, you'd see me grinning as I read Mi An Lipe's column in ROUNDEL. Her observations are so apropos – and familiar, if you know what I mean. Like for instance, one of her themes, what she calls Situational Awareness, positively has to resonate with anyone who must face the inane behavior of some drivers out there, day in, day out. (In case you've missed reading her column, this has to do with keeping an eagle eye out for road conditions and traffic situations that may impact you, figuratively if not literally, whether you're cruising down the Interstate or negotiating a crowded parking lot.) For drivers like me, who like to think they know everything about avoiding mayhem on the road, her comments and advice on that point are useful reminders that we're not perfect.

However, the very mention of Ms. Lipe's comments reminds me of another kind of awareness that's not about driving per se but is equally important in the long run. It's what today's piece is all about.

I am of course referring to the paltry little things you want to keep track of with your BMWs when they are safely parked in the garage or driveway. Like the proverbial missing horseshoe nail, they are easily overlooked or postponed in the hubbub of one's daily routine. But ignoring them can leave one high and dry when it's least convenient, to put it mildly.

Considering that this is a BMW Club publication, I can skip the usual stuff that any knowledgeable car owner pays attention to, such as engine oil (assuming there's a dipstick) and coolant levels, tire pressures, battery condition, and so forth. Besides, these are more of concern to those of us with older cars, since any BMW built in the last

two or three decades will probably let you know if there's trouble a-brewing.

What I do want to talk about is things that may seem like minutiae but still fall squarely into your lap, mainly because there are no sensors to warn you of potential (if not imminent) problems.

First off, is your spare tire pressure up to snuff? (I am, of course, assuming your BMW has one.) It's one of those out-of-sight, out-of-mind items, so checking it for proper pressure is insurance against finding yourself with a flat spare when you need it most – like in the middle of Nowhere, in a rainstorm. I for one check the air in my spares about every other (or third) time I check my road tires. And I do it whether the spare is regular-size (like on my E23) or 'temporal' (like on my Z3 and the family Fusion).

There's also a lot to be said for vacuuming the engine compartment. And no, this is not a typo. I'm not talking about degreasing the engine; I really mean giving it a good going-over with your trusty shop vac. Even garaged vehicles may need it because small critters find warm engine bays to be great places to dine on nuts and seeds on a cold day. Removing the trash, including excreta, they leave behind is alone worth the effort. (That's not to mention checking for wiring which said critters may have chewed on for dessert.) But if your car spends any length of time parked outdoors, there's also likely to be debris, leaves and pine needles, that have infiltrated that space under the hood. How often you do this 'procedure' depends on conditions, so use your judgment, but do it. A clean engine bay isn't just pretty; it's also easier to work on, for you or your favorite mechanic. And it's safer. There's nothing more distracting than seeing smoke curling from under the hood – from leaves (or nut shells) frying on a

hot manifold!

Speaking of vacuuming: Your car may have another space that could use periodic cleaning. Lacking the proper technical term, I call it the air plenum. On some cars, it's under the grille in front of the windshield; in others, it may be hidden under the rear lip of the hood. In either case, it not only serves as the fresh air intake but probably contains the windshield wiper motor and perhaps the interior fan motor as well. Over time, debris will accumulate in there, with (potentially) dire results. I know of at least two cases (one an E30, the other a VW Jetta) when wiper motors caught fire because trash prevented them from operating. Getting a vacuum hose into this space may be a bear, but it's worth the effort.

Another source of problems you want to watch out for is electrical/electronic devices that are in any way connected to your car's system. If left on for any length of time, they will drain your battery. Yeah, I know; modern cars are never completely asleep, so you probably use a float charger to offset the resulting (and minimal) drain while

your Bimmer is in the garage. But what about all those times you're visiting family or friends; and the car is sitting in the driveway overnight; and it's a cold night? Oh, and you forgot that your trusty Valentine One was still on, and your phone, tablet, laptop or whatever was still plugged in and charging? 'Nuff said.

Finally (at least for now) there's the check I'd recommend you perform after you've taken your car to the your local dealership or independent shop. I call it the Post-Service Inquisition; and here's why. Regardless of how professional their technicians are, they're also human. They get distracted; they may be in a hurry or tired; and they

overlook things. You may recall my story about the 'Service Engine' light coming on just as I was leaving the local dealership in my Z3. Well, I had a similar experience the other day, when I found a lug nut in the driveway which belonged to the Fusion. It seems the tech had been rotating the tires and forgot to torque the last two nuts! (I found another nut was only half-tight.)

The upside of such inspections is that you may find nice tools a tech had forgotten under the hood. Keep them. Over the years, I've amassed a fine collection of Snap-On wrenches and screwdrivers in this fashion. I call it fair payback for my patience.

The end result was that we pressed my Dad's E30 (325e) into a surrogate role for the car. February 3rd presented itself as a beautifully sunny,

if rather chilly, day that was just about perfect for filming. On the winding country roads of Johnston County, we had a chance to turn the old Bimmer into an important supporting role in the project, using the backdrop to replicate the rolling farm country in Colorado. One of the film makers grew up in the Columbine area and remembers the events of that day in a very personal way; he was in a local elementary school at the time. You

can tell it is a very personal work of art for him, being made to support a very worthy cause.

A very pleasant and productive afternoon ensued. Fascinating set of intersections, bringing together the connection between events a generation ago on the other side of the country ... the car my Dad bought in NJ 34 years ago ... and an accidental connection made possible through the magic of modern technology. Some of the things we do with

cars are pure fun; today was thought provoking and a great reminder of the value of personal connections. -Robert McIsaac

CLUB RACING REPORT

VIR Club Race & Outing Preview; BWR Scores At Daytona

Well, fellow club racing fans, it's March. The 2018 BMW CCA Club Racing (CR) season is officially in its third month, but we still don't have a whole lot to talk about. And here's why. So far, all the action on CR circuits has been out West. And other racing venues frequented by our homegrown racing crowd hadn't produced any news by the time we filed this report.

One of the two 'local' NASA Regions, Southeast, did put on their annual 'Winter Meltdown' race a couple of weeks ago at CMP. As usual, the event included classes such as Spec E30 and GTS which local hot shoes run in. But to date, we haven't heard if any of them were there. And the Mid-Atlantic guys were only gearing up for their 'March Madness' race at VIR some three weeks from now, so the entry list for that event was still beyond our reach as well.

On the other hand, we did get a look at the entry list for the big ChumpCar race at Road Atlanta early last month. But lack of the right info about teams (they only list team names, not participating racers) has kept us from spotting any of them as being from our neck of the woods. (We obviously need an inside source.)

What's more, we still don't know how local hot shoes made out in their quest for class championships in CR's 2017 season. According to our sources, that information isn't due to be published until later this month. Go figure. In short, we're still in a standby mode as far as anything about club racing hereabouts is concerned. But that's about to change.

Early next month – on April 6, to be exact – we will kick off the 2018 CR season for our home-

grown racing crowd by hosting the annual spring race at VIR. Since this is effectively the season starter for Club racers east of the Smokies (if not the Mississippi), it's no wonder that entries have been trickling in from all over the Eastern Seaboard since late January. And if the past is any indication, the field will include just about every local racer worth his or her mettle.

As always, the event will include a racing school under the auspices of our favorite local pro team, BimmerWorld, which no doubt will add new faces to the ranks of our local racing family. And lest we forget, Brenda Dunlevy, our Activities Chair, is already hard at work organizing the traditional mid-weekend Club Race Outing for local race fans, their families and friends. You don't want to miss the corral and hospitality tent at the track, or the chance to drive your own car on lunchtime parade laps around the course. The date for all that is April 7 (Saturday), so be sure to mark your calendar and register. For more details, contact Jon and Maria Strine at strine@vexate.net.

Turning to the pro racing front: By now, you probably know that BimmerWorld Racing (BWR) team owner/racer James Clay has jumped into the 2018 IMSA Continental Tire Sports Car Challenge (ICTSC) series with both feet as it were, by entering one car each in both the Grand Sport (GS) and Street Tuner (ST) classes this season. The good news is that the move has paid off handsomely for the team.

The first round in the series, at Daytona in late January, saw Devin Jones and Nick Galante in the No.81 328i win ST; while Clay and Tyler Cooke in the No.82 M4 GT4 claimed a spot on

the GS podium by finishing second. Jones started on the pole and never flagged, allowing Galante to continue the charge to the finish. Clay, on the other hand, started 18th but was able to move up quickly. He led the pack for one lap early in the race and stayed in the Top Ten until Cooke took over on Lap 68 and continued the charge to the checker and podium.

(In that context, we hope you'll forgive us our major goof in last month's report, in which we labeled the 'Roar before the Rolex' as Round One in the series. As any racing fan knows, the 'Roar' refers to the test days which precede the Daytona race weekend. We must've had a serious case of writer's Red Mist.)

The ST victory vindicated all the years BWR had spent developing the F-30-based platform into a competitive racing machine. And doing it with a brand-new pair of drivers made it doubly sweet, so the fact that 2018 is the last season for the ST class in the series should in no shape or form diminish this achievement.

As for Clay and Cooke's second-place finish

in GS, we see it as clear evidence that the M4 – not to mention Clay and Cooke – can duke it out with the best in the class. To be sure, GS is a large and growing class; and the field as a whole has also grown with the addition of a Touring class (mainly Audis). Along with the remaining ST cars, this will make upcoming races more traffic-prone and hence more demanding. But given Clay and Cooke's knack for avoiding incidents, things look promising for the team.

As you read this, the next race, Round Two at Sebring, is just two weeks away. And you can be sure that we'll be watching it 'live' – aka streaming on IMSA TV
