Back in 1987, when the Stilwells owned the local BMW dealership, they occasionally favored one of their customers with a ticket to the BMW Performance Driving School at Willow Springs. I was so honored in 1987 and found my way to a Rosamond motel during a business trip to Twentynine Palms. This allowed me to take the Skip Barber Course which modified (for the better) my driving skills.

This past Summer, I was pleasantly surprised to receive an invitation from BMWUSA to attend the One-Day PDS at the recently opened BMW West Coast Driving/Delivery Center at Thermal, California. BMW included a two-night stay at the JW Marriott Desert Springs Resort and Spa as part of the complimentary package.

I chose the 22nd of November for the course date because it was right next to the Thanksgiving holiday. I figured that fewer people would want to attend then and I would have more individual instruction.

My drive to the Palm Springs area on the 21st was reminiscent of the first part of the drive several of us took in August on the way to the two-week BMW extravaganza at Monterey.

I arrived at the Resort and Spa in good humor and enjoyed a monstrous set of rooms overlooking the lagoons and pool areas with the mountains as backdrop. It seems that the thousand nights I had spent in Marriott properties over the years entitled me to a an upgraded suite with dining room for 12, living room and



an extra bathroom or two. And the ample separate bedroom.


I awoke on the morning of the 22nd with a clear idea of the 30-minute drive to the Thermal Club which proved to be slightly in error. The BMW facility had, just that week, relocated the entry to a different street. Google had not been informed. And there was no signage. I eventually guessed where to go and promptly took a photo so I would not forget (in case I would some day return).

There were eight of us in the class, four women and four men. Four of the eight were around my age, including one of the women. Student rides included a 760, X4, M3, X5, 328i, 325Ci, and there was another 435i M-Sport matching my own. Our two instructors were an "old-timer" and a much younger "California" type. Both were excellent teachers and accomplished drivers in their own right, as they proved when taking us on hot laps at the end of the long and challenging day. The morning began at 0830hrs with the obligatory classroom lessons, as well as teacher and student autobiographies.



We moved on to our cars: M235i and 340i, both examples of 330+HP. All cars were shod with Continental rubber in a new formula that competes with the Michelins many of us had tried out in Monterey last August. Activities included straight line braking, shunts, cone dodging, dry and wet skid pad races a timed autocross and several other handling exercises. The day was halved by a nicely catered lunch in the new facility. The high point of my day was finishing 3rd in the Graduation Autocross. Particularly since I was knocked out in the first round of the skid-pad races.



Then, instructor-piloted hot-laps (with students seated front and rear) on the larger race course showed us that we still had a few things to learn. (Congratulatory Note to Self: good choice grabbing the front seat).

Would I recommend this BMW One-Day Performance Driving School to you? Yes. In fact, I am buying the \$775.00 course for my daughter (X3 driver) to take at the Spartanburg Center.




Investing in microfiber towels is the best way to protect your car from swirl marks. Protect your investment by caring for them properly because if done so should last a very long time. Make sure you take the time every once in a while and weed out any towels that need to be replaced. Dirty or old, brittle towels greatly increase the risk of damaging your paint.

Once a towel becomes too soiled with dirt or loaded up with residue from detailing supplies, you'll need to reach for a new towel to fit your needs. Even though you're replacing a "dirty" towel, do not allow any towel to fall carelessly on the ground--that can heavily contaminate your expensive microfiber. I put my dirty towels in one bin after they are used and do not touch them again until after they are washed. This is an easy way to make sure I never use a dirty towel on a clean surface.

In order to keep them in good condition you must wash them carefully. Make sure you separate items that are dirtier from those that are not, so that you do not contaminate the used, but cleaner towels. Shake off as much of the dirt or soil as possible before throwing them into the washer. Some products used in detailing are not meant to be washed away easily, and are impermeable to water, so they can affect the water absorption power of other towels. Using hot water during washing helps this problem. When placing towels in the washer make sure you do not overload them, or they will not be cleaned thoroughly.

Try to avoid washing heavily linting materials such as regular bath towels prior to washing your microfiber towels. Use the highest temperature wash and rinse possible to help break up soil and products. Use "sensitive-skin" type detergent that has no added color or fragrance, or a detergent made for microfiber products to assure no additives get into the towels. Use the Full-Length wash cycle, and the extra rinse cycle. You want to make sure you rinse out soaps and detergents so your towels are completely clear of residues and dirt. NEVER, EVER use softener because it weakens the towel's absorption capabilities.

After properly washing the towels, thoroughly clean the dryer lint trap and ductwork in order to avoid getting lint stuck on your microfiber towels. Set the dryer to NO HEAT. DO NOT use softener sheets as they also affect absorption capabilities of the microfiber towels. In order to reduce static, only dry until they are slightly damp. Fold the towels right out of the dryer as this leads to a lower chance of one falling on the ground or getting contamination from other sources.







ZGT is an original "coach built" design, intended to be an evolution of the iconic BMW 507.

At the urging of US BMW importer, Max Hoffman, the company undertook the design of a new car for the American market. From 1957 to 1959, BMW built 252 examples of the 507, arguably the most beautiful BMW of all time. The 507 almost killed the company, as well.

The 507 was originally planned to sell for about \$5000 at a rate of 5000 cars per year. However, production costs far exceeded estimates, pushing the price ultimately to over \$10,000, well beyond the 507's German competitors...even more than the Corvette.



profitable--offerings which would evolve into the sporting sedans for which the company ultimately became known. This enabled BMW to secure funding to avoid being liquidated.

As a consequence, the evolutionary next-step for the iconic 507 never happened. BMW wouldn't build another true sports car for almost forty years.

The "ZGT" coachbuild on the Z3 platform is a nod in the direction BMW might have taken if not for financial misfortune; perhaps similar to Ferrari's evolution of their 250GT into the legendary 250GTO.

Coachbuilding is very much a part of BMW's history, with fine (and highly desirable) BMW-powered examples

produced by Frua, Ghia, Veritas, Volpini and many other famous automotive design houses.

ZGT integrates styling elements found in several cars of the early 1960s golden age of *gran turisimo* sporting cars. Yet it retains the robust, powerful, safe, comfortable, and reliable Z3 platform and mechanicals.

Partly because of the high production numbers of the Z3 and partly because of the design--revolutionary at the time, but seemingly not standing the test of time to become a "classic"-- book value on the Z3 has fallen to the point where even minor body damage often renders the cars "totaled." i.e., repair costs exceed the book value. That's very much a shame, because the Z3 is as good a car as any of its contemporaries. But it's also a good thing for folks who want a unique, daily driver; which they can

build themselves with the ZGT body panels! [Editor's note: We will get another, closer look at a ZGT at our January 22, 2017 Car Display. This article was penned by John Washington, who promises to bring his car and answer your questions at our annual event.]






