

It Started in Sebring

The History of Sebring Raceway: One of the oldest continuously-operating race tracks in the United States held its first race in 1950. The track occupies part of Sebring Regional Airport, an active airport for private and commercial traffic. Originally built as a World War II training base for the U.S. Army Air Forces, Hendricks Army Airfield, served as a flight training ground for B-17 Flying Fortresses from 1941 to 1946. This lineage was commemorated during the 2002 12 Hours of Sebring by special livery on Gunnar Racing's Panoz, which resembled a World War II-era B-17. After the war, aeronautical engineer Alec Ulmann, seeking sites to restore military aircraft for civilian use, saw potential in Hendricks' runways to stage a sports car endurance race, similar to the 24 Hours of Le Mans. Sebring's first race was held on New Year's Eve of 1950. The Sam Collier 6 Hour Memorial Race was won by Fritz Koster and Ralph Deshon in a Crosley Hot Shot that had been driven to the track by Victor Sharpe. This first race attracted thirty racecars from across North America. The first 12 Hours of Sebring was held on March 15, 1952, and the event has grown into a major international race.

I'm sure you have heard at some point that you can't win a race in the first turn, but you certainly can lose one in it. This is especially true of Sebring's Turn 1; cars can be five wide narrowing down to single file by Turn 3. By the time the car gets through Turn 5 we are starting to find our place. Well, maybe not, as we all show up at Turn 7 (a hairpin), which is a throwaway right-hander—really slow. Brakes and tires are not quite up to where they need to be temperature-wise (the first lap of a race). So, you might get bumped, spun or driven straight through the turn, not having the brakes you want! If you can exit Turn 7 correctly, you will carry the speed you need to get to Turn 10 quickly.



Once you exit Turn 10 you are on your way to the Tower, Turn 13. Hit the curbing on left and apex Turn 13 properly and you can pass here or, in my case, get passed by the faster classed group (higher horsepower) on your way through Bishop's Bend.

Setting up for that pass that would put us into the lead: Coming out of Turn 17 onto the front straight we got a great run, putting pressure on the leader and second-place car. By the time we got to Turn 1, the lead car stayed where he had positioned his car last lap, the second-place car moved to the inside and I stayed to the outside. We kept the leader in the middle and we both passed him. By now the new lead car was committed to the outside going into Turn 3; I was able to get on the inside of the lead car and pass him before we broke for that turn. Now keeping them behind us would be the trick! Our crew was able to determine if they were gaining distance between us or not.

I found once you are in the lead and not chasing someone, you need to know what's going on behind you to keep that lead.



We did manage to get a win at Sebring, which was fantastic! Next we were off to Circuits of the Americas (COTA) in Austin Texas in the later part of March, 2015.



COTA in Texas

This would be our first visit to Austin and this Formula 1 3.4-mile track with 130 feet of elevation. It was all remarkable: The track, the facility and that BMW Club Racing got this setup!

Turn 1 is so steep I wasn't sure we had enough horsepower to climb the hill—Ha-ha! Then, back downhill through the right-hander about flat out gets the car back to speed quickly. Once into Turn 9 you need to be ready to full throttle through Turn 10, a left-hander; no need to pucker up as you will have more grip than you can imagine. Turn 11 is just about a 360-degree left-hander leading into the long straight. At the end is a 90-degree left-hander; then some more fun stuff to Turn 20—another 90-degree left onto the front straight. There are eleven lefts and nine rights here! Now do this in the rain—two days of downpour. Yes, it rained 7 inches in two days! It was the best racing ever! Talk about fun—racing wheel to wheel in the rain when the only sights to be seen were rooster tails and brake lights.

The Hoosier rain tires were the best! I couldn't believe the grip we had. It was enough to get another win and a couple of thirds. We had a chance for two wins that weekend. "J" was able to pass as everyone broke too soon. It worked out great for half of the last lap of that race. However, the anti-fog on the windshield didn't cut it, there were no rooster tails to follow, and no visible brake lights once in the lead. So, yes, we got passed and ended in third.

I've talked about this before: Rain driving is the best. You have to be smooth driving, braking, and shifting—no sudden movements with the wheel. Imagine going as fast on a long straight in the pouring rain as when it's dry. Oh, I puckered the first time doing just that, but as long as you are smooth on your transitions you wouldn't have a problem. Well, maybe you will, if there's oil on the track, but rain and oil on that long straight weren't expected; we managed to stay on track all three days.

All that rain drove the scorpions to higher ground—even to #57's rear tire. Yes, the crew found a live one resting there. Now, I really enjoyed Austin, but don't think I'll be moving there anytime soon!

The Return to Sebring

Next we returned to Sebring for BMW Club Racing's National event on May 1, marking its twentieth anniversary—great event, fun weekend. Our crew increased by one for this event, as, Paul, a friend from my old neighborhood in Ohio actually lives in Sebring. The featured race ended up being the race we won! So, a big points race and big points week for us. Weather was fantastic too!

Sebring has a 6-hour enduro in January, but that's something for which we aren't ready yet. We weren't prepared to participate in enduro races this year but are working towards that. An enduro is something that should be well planned out car-wise: Managing fuel, tires, brakes and pit stops will win the races.

DRIVING AWAY

Next, it was off to Mid-Ohio for Northern Ohio Chapter's annual Memorial Day event--always a great weekend!

Mid-Ohio

Mid-Ohio: It's the most technical track in the country. In Turn 1 at the start of a race you can be three or four wide; somehow there seems to be room (not really)! A fast turn flat out leading up to the chicane. Tap the brakes and go into the keyhole--a slow off-camber downhill right-hander onto the back straight--fastest place on the track. Then, braking at the 350-foot area, apexing right into the esses. Next, a left-hander up over a sharp hill, getting at the top; then, plant your car properly over the hill and get on your way to Thunder Valley. Take the right-hander into Thunder Valley with the right side tires on the grass, go over the hill, pucker up as you drift out to the left, hit the grass, and you're done for the weekend. Back to the right about 8 inches off the guardrail, tap the brakes and apex to the left on your way into the carousel. Finally, a sharp right-hander with a bump unsettling your car, being prepared to full throttle through and onto the front straight to start all over—1 minute and 37 seconds' worth. This place has a great infield to sit and watch the races. We placed well here.

June at the Glen

We had been leading nationally as well as regionally all season until we raced at the Glen, our nemesis! Both Kevin and Jerry are not far behind in points, so we needed a second-place finish or better to stay ahead. However, we have yet to make an entire race weekend there. Our first year, the wall in the esses got us; the second year we blew a head gasket. This year: A pin hole in a "new" radiator hose led to a warped head. We are looking forward to 2016 at the Glen, as each race weekend there we get further along. We are on pace to finish the whole weekend—lots of laughs. Well, that warped head kept us from some great points races—National and Premier events. We missed the opening of PIRC's new extended track, Calabogie, Summit Point, Mosport, Mont Tremblant, and Road Atlanta.

O'Fest

So, we got #57 put back together and did a test and tune at Nelson Ledges—still a favorite track. All was good, so off to Oktoberfest in New Jersey. We had a practice upon arrival at the end of the day and all was good. NOT! On the banked right-hand turn into the front straight we snapped three left front wheel studs (new ones). Pit in was right there, which was a good thing. Better to be lucky than good. With the great crew we had, #57 had a new front hub and studs by 10:30 that night. We were all ready for the next day. On race day, the rear calipers didn't want to release right away, the rotors broke in two, the radiator didn't want to stay full. As it turned out, the radiator hose connection had a pin hole. We were done, ending the season.



The Future

We start our 2016 race season at Sebring on January 20 with a new paint design on #57. We should have the body work complete for the start of the season. Our full race schedule has not been decided on yet. We will keep you posted!
