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PAUL HOECKE Notes from the road Cop Stories

No doubt each and every one of us Joy of Driving types has had his or her share of encounters with arms of the law of the traffic variety. And I'd say it's a safe guess that not all of them were pleasant. Now, in all my years on the road, I too have had my share of such encounters. Except that I for one have found that these tete-a-tetes with the law don't have to be traumatic. At worst, they can be – well, cathartic is one term I can think of. At best, they can be reasonably pleasant, even quite funny.

Mostly, it's a matter of attitude – mainly yours as the driver, which hopefully will be echoed by the law enforcement individual you're facing. (Although come to think of it, the car you're driving can also make a difference.) Anyway, this being the season for vacation road trips – hence also many opportunities for close encounters with flashing blue lights – allow me to relate a few episodes which may illustrate what I'm talking about. And I'll start off with your typical speeding-stop story.

One day, many moons ago, I was sorting out my '80 Euro E23 (aka the Green Monster) by giving it what is commonly known as an Italian Tune-Up; i.e. I was blasting down this nice, empty two-lane in Chatham County at who knows what speed. (I'd just acquired the car and one of its faults was a totally unreliable speedometer.) Now normally, you wouldn't see a state trooper on that back road in a month of Sundays. But fate dictated that this was one of those rare exceptions. Sure enough, the trooper showed up out of nowhere and pulled me over. As he ambled up to my window, I could tell he was giving the Monster

a thorough once-over.

When he asked me if I knew how fast I'd been going, I said I didn't, which was mostly true. (I did know that my tach had topped 3500 rpm in top gear, which may have meant 70+ mph, but that was a wild guess.) But when I told him about the wonky speedometer, he got in the Monster, looked closely at all the German-language gauges and said: "Son, there's nothin' in the law about speedometers." (He really talked like that.) So I told him about how I once had driven all the way to Wisconsin sans speedo, using the rpm readings instead. (It was O'fest '78, and Miller & Norburn hadn't fixed my Bavaria's odo in time.) He nodded, gave it some thought, and finally said:"Son, you sound like you know somethin' about cars. So I'll just write you up for five over the limit. Drive safe." And that was that. Considering I'd been doing a whole lot more, all I could do was thank him - and my stars for him being a car guy.

His blue lights were on and – oh, oh – he was backing down the shoulder toward me. As he got out of his cruiser and walked over, I could tell he was all business. I gave him my best grin and said something about a blown tire, but he didn't rise to the bait. His first question was the usual one, about how fast I'd been going. To which I replied that it must've been at about the speed limit, which was absolutely true – probably within seconds after my detector sounded off. By then, he'd also taken a quick peek inside the car, but my Passport was in a very secure location and undetectable. In short, it was a standoff.

ready to drive off that he walked over and said with what I believe was a wink: "Sir, you realize that radar detectors are illegal in this state." It wasn't a question, so I only nodded, thanked him for his help and hit the road.

CLUB RACING REPORT

Zulman, Howerton Post Multiple Wins at Roebling

Hello, fellow club racing fans. Those of you who love the ambiance of motorsports – the flurry of activity in the paddock before the race, the smell of hot brake pads in the morning – will no doubt agree that nothing beats actually being there in person. But showing up at every race one wants to see isn't in the cards for most racing fans. So here's a suggestion (in case you aren't already doing it): The next best thing to being there is catching the action on your tablet or PC as it's streamed live in real time. Doing so you'll miss the reek of brake pads and all that but little else. You get to see the race from different vantage points along the track, something that's hard to do when you're there in the flesh. And this time of the year you avoid broiling in the heat as well. (Confession: It's how we manage to cover the progress of our local favorite pro team, Bimmer-World Racing.)

Of course, streaming coverage is pretty much the province of big-bucks pro racing. So when it comes to covering BMW CCA Club Racing (CR), we have to do it the old fashioned way, via the CR website and MyLaps. It's our main excuse for being a couple of laps down in reporting many race results. More to the point, it's why this report includes the results of only two CR events.

Contrary to our story last month, the race at Roebling Road in mid-June saw only two, not three, local hot shoes – Rich Zulman (IP) and Bert Howerton (Spec E36) – show up. But both drivers did our chapter proud, especially Zulman. He won two sprints outright and finished second, overall and in class, in the third sprint race and the enduro. Finishing a few cars behind Zulman each

time, Howerton posted solo class wins in all four races.

The club race during the Pittsburgh Vintage Grand Prix (PVGP) event on the second weekend in July included only one local track warrior, Dennis Pippy, competing in a sizable IP field. He actually qualified second, but only managed to finish in fourth, third and seventh place in the event's three sprint races.

A club race at Summit Point, held late last month, listed four local drivers among its entrants: IP racers Zulman, Jerry Kaufman and Sean McKay; and DM pilot Todd Newcomer (he was the no-show at the Roebling Road race). But given the late date of the event, results were not available at press time.

Meanwhile, on the pro front, BimmerWorld Racing (BWR) continued to chase the gold in the IMSA Continental Tire Sportscar Challenge (ICTSC) with their two F30 chassis-based Street Tuner (ST) 328i's. However, their results in the two latest rounds, No.4 at Watkins Glen at the start of the Fourth of July weekend and No.5 at Mosport a week later, were encouraging but considerably less than what team owner/driver James Clay had hoped for.

At the Glen, the team only managed to eke out two Top Ten finishes, and even that involved some drama. Tyler Cooke, having qualified third in ST in the No.84 car, started fast and was running second in Lap One when moments later his right front wheel came off! He somehow made it safely around the track to the pits, but lost a whole lap during repairs. Forced to play catch up during his entire stint, he still did well enough to

allow Clay to take over at the tail end of the lead lap. Clay then fought his way through the field and, aided by attrition, took the checker in ninth place. Meanwhile, Ari Balogh in the No.81 BMW had started 17th but moved up steadily and was running ninth when the race was red-flagged due to weather. Greg Liefooghe took over in tenth place at the restart and was able to forge ahead to finish in seventh place. About the only consolation for BMW fans (if you can call it that) was that two MINIs, driven by Mat and Mark Pombo respectively, topped the ST class with one-two finishes.

The Mosport race started out much better for the team, but not without a hitch. First off, there appears to have been a problem with the No.81 car, for while both of BWR's entries ran in practice, only the No.84 car, with Cooke at the wheel, showed up for qualifying. As BWR's lone entry, Cooke qualified second and, having quickly taken over the lead seconds after the green flag, proceeded to run what we think was a brilliant

race during his stint. He widened his lead over the rest of the ST crowd to some six seconds and was at times running all by himself – until a lengthy full course yellow more than half-way through the race bunched up the field. That's when BWR's dreams of a podium finish began to fade.

Clay took over when the ST cars were allowed to pit late during the yellow and was second at the restart. But unlike Cooke, he seemed unable to keep up the pace during the remainder of the race. He slipped from second to third, then fourth place; eventually fell some fourteen seconds behind the three ST frontrunners; suffered a brief bump encounter with another BMW, the Miller Motorsports 228i; and to add insult to injury, was passed by that same 228i shortly before the checker flew. Clay ended up finishing fifth. In short, it was a bummer.

BWR's next ICTSC race, Round Five at Lime Rock, ran late last month, well past our deadline for this report. We can only hope to have more positive news about that in our next report.
